From the Port Nelson Liaison Committee

The PNLC comprises seven members being three Port Hills Residents elected by the community, three appointed by Port Nelson Ltd, and an Independent Chairman. The PNLC meets at least four times per year and its role is to;

- oversee the implementation of the Port Nelson Noise Mitigation Plan;
- ensure that Port Nelson is aware of the noise concerns of its neighbours, and are taking steps to minimize and mitigate future Port Noise:
- ensure that proper noise complaint records are maintained, are up to date, and are acted upon;
- ensure that Port Nelson is accurately measuring noise levels:
- see that Port Nelson and other Port Users adopt the best practical options to ensure the emission of noise does not exceed a reasonable level and;
- monitor the acoustic treatment of properties within the noise contour areas.

The PNLC met five times over this calendar year. The full minutes from the meetings can be found on the Port Nelson website and a summary of the meeting minutes is on page two.

Introducing New Residents Rep -David Scott



David is a happy resident of the Port Effects Overlay, it's a great area to live. David is also right in the 'funnel' of the port, so therefore fully aware of the noise the port produces. David is looking forward to the opportunity to share his experience with the committee to help with the management of noise.

David comes from an aviation background where he has extensive experience in most operational areas. David brings an understanding of the commercial realities of operating a major port, while addressing effectively the concerns of those community members whose lives are impacted by the port noise. David was involved with noise related issues during his time with Nelson Airport.

David recently had the opportunity to tour the port. He was impressed with the scale of the operation and got to see first-hand some of the challenges the employees face.

Holcim Buffalo Update

Resolving an increase in noise complaints from residents' about the Holcim Buffalo vessel has progressed well after Holcim, the Port, Port Noise Liaison Committee (PNLC) and residents worked collaboratively to address the residents' concerns. In July 2019 Holcim commissioned a noise survey report to identify the noise sources and recommendations for mitigating the noise. Together with the Port and the PNLC, their patience whilst this project is underway.

Holcim then met with a group of residents at the Port and visited some residents at home to outline how they planned to address the residents' concerns.

Since then Holcim has designed, custom built and installed two rounds of noise mitigation solutions to address the noise from the vessel, and consequently delivered improved noise outcomes from this vessel when she calls into Nelson.

Main Wharf North Redevelopment

In December 2019 the Port started work on replacing a section of the main wharf known as 'Main Wharf North'. The 2400sgm section of the wharf has deteriorated with age and has been unusable since 2016.

General Manager Infrastructure Allanagh Rivers says the \$20 million dollar investment in redeveloping the northern section of the main wharf will increase the Port's resilience, move main wharf container operations further away from residential neighbours and future proof the Port to accommodate larger vessels.

"The Port is committed to being a good neighbour and this redevelopment will help mitigate and reduce the effects of noise generated from Port operations. The additional footprint of usable wharf means ships can be berthed further north and further away from residential properties."

"The port is also a lifeline utility and in the event of a natural disaster such as an earthquake, would be critical during the recovery phase if the region was not accessible by road or air. This redevelopment will ensure the Port can be operating with limited capacity within days of a disaster." says Allanagh

The project works are approximately 60% complete, all of the piling is finished, the ground improvement works are complete and the deck portion of the structure is starting to take shape. The new section of the wharf will be operational in 2021.

"Once completed the new section of the main wharf will also enable the Port to attract larger 260 to 280 metre vessels and 300 metre cruise vessels. Future proofing the Port infrastructure will have long lasting benefits for the region including creating growth opportunities for our customers," says Allanagh.

The Port and PNLC would like to thank the community for

Helping Mitigate Port Noise

The Port Nelson Noise Mitigation Plan provides for the acoustic treatment of properties located on the Port Noise Contour Map.

This means your existing house may be eligible for a contribution to reduce the sound from port operations. The contribution offered by Port Nelson will depend on the location of your home within the Port Nelson Noise Contours, and the acoustic treatment required is conformed by an Acoustic Engineer. The sound insulation measures may include double glazing windows or window seals, sound insulation on interior walls and ceilings or a ventilation system to circulate fresh air through your home so windows can be kept closed.
